LETTER FROM THE CHAIRPERSON

Our Chair's Vision

There is no question: 2024 will be a transformative year for Family Promise of the Big Bend.

Throughout the year we will renovate HOPE, which is the only shelter for homeless families in the Big Bend. After years and years of deferred maintenance, we are grateful to the Department of Children and Families for funds to substantially refurbish our dorms and kitchen. To be frank, the buildings have leaky roofs, broken windows, and cracked bathroom tiles. The first time I walked through the halls, I almost cried.

For the 150 or so residents we have on any given day, and the ratio is about two children to every adult, we should be offering a safe and comfortable place to stay. The refurbishment will also allow for a significant upgrade in security which is critically important as we frequently serve mothers seeking refuge from abusive relationships.

Personally, one of my favorite changes will be an opportunity to renovate the classroom with a comfortable reading area and technology that ensures our students have access to computers.

All of these transformational efforts come on the heels of efforts begun in 2023 via gifts from the private sector. Bank of America, our business partner of 2023, granted funds for us to plant fruit trees and a garden at HOPE and Walmart led a bevy of volunteers to update and repaint our housing for veterans.

We're open 24-hours a day, 7-days a week. It's the kind of work that lets you sleep well on your pillow at night, because you're definitely working on a cause greater than yourself.

Our Appreciation:


